ertha Lloyd is the perfect teacher. At least she is the perfect teacher for a class in how to escape debt and poverty and how to get control of your finances.

Bertha grew up poor in rural Alabama. She eventually moved up to Chattanooga, married and worked for the State. She and her husband later separated, leaving her with a second mortgage on their home that became a financially crushing burden.

Although Bertha accepted Christ as a child she had stopped attending church. After she and her husband separated she went back to church and rededicated her life to God.

In order to grow in her renewed faith. Bertha attended women's retreats and a regular Bible study. Through these she found a friend and mentor. Aunt Hattie. While her faith was renewed and strengthened she continued to struggle with the mortgages on her home as well as mounting medical and credit card bills. The situation grew bad enough that she started falling behind on her mortgage payments. As Bertha shared and prayed about her continuing financial struggles,

Aunt Hattie encouraged her to attend a money management seminar and even paid for her to go. At the [Larry Burkett] seminar Jim, the teacher, taught her, "everything I needed to hear." Through the scriptures she discovered that God was concerned about how she spent her money. After the seminar Jim counseled Bertha one on one and she started to keep a close account of her spending and stuck to a budget.

In less than a year, with this new budget and some savings, she cleared up her credit card debts and medical bills. She also refi-

he major criteria for a college loan are vital signs. In a 1997 study the average debt of grads was \$18,800, up from \$8,200 in 1991 (CNN 10/23/97, "Debt 101: College graduates learn reality of loans"). Piled atop is credit card debt. In 1999 78% of undergrads had a credit card, with an average balance of \$2,748 ("Debt smoth-

ers America's Youth," Christine Dugas, USA Today, 2/13/01).

Since then I have graduated and am thinking about grad school for teaching and also for seminary. I am semi-fluent in Spanish as I've been raised in a bicultural home, and my heart lies in ministering Jesus and His cross to people of diverse cultures. I spent a semester studying in the Czech Republic while at Covenant. These desires are very real and I hope may come to fruition one day.

This brings me to the point of this "story of my life." Like many recent college

grads I find myself with large amounts of government loans to pay off. I myself have close to \$30,000. not including interest. My fear is that I will end up in some company climbing a ladder to what many call "success," and lose the desire that was once planted in me, or more accurately, that my financial constraints may preclude me from serving Christ in some of the aforementioned ways. As I make my monthly loan payments I am reminded of this fear, but yet I have faith that even this obstacle may be overcome if it is God's will for me to be used in His work either in urban or foreign settings."

nanced her mortgage and got her monthly payments down to a manageable sum. Today Bertha is close to owning her home debt free.

She declares, "It wasn't me! It was the Holy Spirit in me convicting me to do the right thing at the time I was ready to do it God's way." She overcame procrastination and fear when Jim used the Bible to convict her to be bold in depending

on God's guidance in her financial decisions. Bertha says, "The Word of God really set me free from that blindness."

Bertha added to her personal experience by attending a Christian Financial Concepts (CFC) training and in 1993 became a certified CFC counselor. With her new knowledge and skills she started offering money management training at her church and on weekend retreats.

Bertha is now retired and free to help at the Bethlehem Church and Economic Development Center in Alton Park, Chattanooga, where the Chalmers Center is helping to establish a money management class.
