This was our 11th
Team trip to East Africa. We seek to serve
national churches according to our spiritual
gifting. All but one of
the 17 days were
spent in ministry or
travel.

We took 20 bags to Kenya-over half of which were filled with clothing, various gifts and medical supplies

Since 1995, African Americans have gone on short-term ministries 39 times, while Whites have gone 33 times. Reggie is the first fulltime Black pastor to come with us. By God's grace, 15 Black churches have been directly represented over the years (for many, their first missionary). Many other Black churches have financially supported Team members and generously given many gifts for Africans.
